Upon completion of the CSSG volunteer opportunity, student participants who meet the eligibility criteria can also apply to

receive a grant between \$1,000 and \$5,000.

If the CSSG is of interest to Frontier students, we encourage you to apply as soon as possible as there are many exciting opportunities to be taken advantage of!

After you register, you will be invited to join volunteer training. Upon completion, student volunteers will begin service activities.

We hope that you take advantage of this exciting opportunity to showcase your talents, and find strength and connection within your community during this unprecedented time.

Who is eligible to participate in Canada Student Service Grant (CSSG) volunteer opportunities?

Volunteer opportunities through the CSSG are open to applicants who meet the following criteria:

- Canadian Citizens, permanent residents, First Nations, Metis or Inuit, or those with Refugee status.
- Students who are enrolled in an accredited post-secondary institution in September 2020 or recently graduated no earlier than December 2019.
 - This includes part-time or full-time studies in pursuit of a degree, diploma or certificate at an accredited institution over a period of at least 12 weeks.
 - <u>Accredited institutions</u> include universities, colleges and Indigenous learning institutions accredited by the province or territory in which they are located.
 - Canadian students who study abroad but are currently residing in Canada and do their volunteer hours in Canada.
 - Students currently attending spring/summer classes are also eligible.

All students who meet the above criteria will be eligible to apply for the grant upon successful completion of their CSSG volunteer opportunities.

Who is eligible to receive the Canada Student Service Grant (CSSG)?

To be eligible to receive the CSSG, student participants must be:

- Canadian citizens, permanent residents, First Nations, Metis or Inuit, or those with Refugee status.
- Enrolled and attending an accredited post-secondary institution during spring, summer and/or fall 2020 or recently graduated no earlier than December 2019.
 - This includes part-time or full-time studies in pursuit of a degree, diploma or certificate at an accredited institution over a period of at least twelve weeks.
 - Accredited institutions include universities, colleges and Indigenous learning institutions accredited by the province or territory in which they are located.
 - Canadian students who study abroad but are currently residing in Canada and do their volunteer hours in Canada.

All post-secondary students and recent graduates, up to the age of 30, who meet the eligibility criteria, including the required number of volunteer service hours, will receive the grant.

May 27, 2020 Engaged Learners and Indspire Conference in Ottawa

The Frontier Engaged Learners program recently sent 4 students to the National Indspire Youth Conference in Ottawa. All from different communities in Manitoba, students Evan, Tia, Ronaldo and Dre were chosen from a larger group of Engaged Learner applicants based on their academic performance and residence, showing outstanding attitudes and work ethics!

Each of the students had a great time on this adventure. Along with the Division chaperones, the group attended the Indspire Conference, and visited the Supreme Court of Canada, the Parliament Buildings, the Bank of Canada, and went to an NHL hockey game.

This trip provided an important opportunity for our youth involved. Upon reflection, students said they learned more about themselves, made valuable new friendships, and that the experience even made them stronger. For some, it was their first time travelling by airplane!

Since the trip has finished, our student Evan has been featured at the top of the Indspire website. We're so proud to see not only the impression this experience had on our students, but the impression our students made at the Indspire Conference.

The show is a nationally broadcast celebration of culture, showcasing the diversity of Indigenous peoples in Canada, including performances by Canada's biggest names in Indigenous entertainment.

March 13, 2020 COVID-19 (Coronavirus) - Update and Additional Measures

Updated December 7, 2020

On December 2 the Minister of Education announced for the two-week period of January 4-15, 2021, Grade 7-12 students will be provided with remote learning.

Students in Nursery to Grade 6 will continue to be offered in-class learning, but parents will have the option to choose remote learning for this two-week period. Should you be interested in this option, please contact your school administration no later than December 14, 2020.

Students in Grade 7-12 with special needs, or those at-risk that must be accommodated in a classroom setting, will be allowed to attend school during this time period.

February 26, 2020 Talons Make School History

To say the Minegoziibe Anishinabe Talons have had a good season is a bit of an understatement. Sure, they've won a bunch of games (16-5) and some tournaments, but the varsity boys basketball team has done more than that. They've made Pine Creek First Nation history.

The Talons are now the first Minegoziibe Anishinabe School team to win a Zone 8 Championship, ever.

"It's really huge for this school. Everyone in this school feels like they're a part of it," said MAS PE teacher and Talons coach David Kopecky. "We didn't get the chance last year, so to come back and win it this year, it really does mean a lot. It's a special feeling."

The team was on fire from the beginning of the zones and never looked back. In the semi-final they beat Ste. Rose, 96-54 and netted a huge 107-79 win in the finals against the Grandview Spartans. That's 203 points in just two games.

"We're really aggressive. We're fast and we apply a lot of pressure and we capitalize on our chances," said Kopecky.

Winning the zones wasn't the only title that the team has taken home. In December, they beat the Winnipegosis Lakers to win the Elm Creek Tournament and in January they clocked second place at the Pizza Place Classic. They also won another title in February when they took down the St. Boniface Diocean Tournament.

The 16-5 season is one of the most successful in recent years for the team.

"I'm very proud of these boys, they're working so hard," said Kopecky, *"they've done such a good job this year of working hard."* The Talons are currently the sixth-ranked team in the province, but Kopecky believes they may end up higher when the newest rankings come out on February 27.

Next up for the team is a provincial qualifier event. They'll either play in Treherne, Sprague, or Pinawa and, if they play well, they'll head to Fisher River for the Provincial Championships in March.

"We're very confident, wherever we play, we just have to play as we have been all season. We're looking forward to it, that's for sure."

February 14, 2020 Brigette Lacquette Presented with Frontier Achievement Award



Frontier School Division established the Frontier Achievement Award in 1998 to recognize the honour and achievements of those who have attended school in the Division.

This year, we were happy to present the Frontier Achievement Award to Brigette Lacquette, Olympian and member of Canada's National Women's Hockey team!

A graduate of Rorketon School, Brigette recently returned to Frontier to present for students from Helen Betty Osborne Ininiw Education Resource Centre and Jack River School in Norway house.

Brigette started skating at the age of four, playing hockey at the nearest indoor rink to her home. Attending school, she continued to pursue hockey, spending countless hours representing Waterhen School while working just as hard to achieve academic success.

Striving to succeed in all her pursuits, Brigette was seen as a role model and mentor due to her skill level even at a young age. She included all players during practices, games and classes, wanting her fellow students to achieve success.

Today, Brigette is the first First Nations hockey player to be called to Canada's National Women's Hockey team. She recognizes that she is a role model for young First Nations athletes, a job she's happy to accept.

Brigette continues to be a role model for her home community and all our students in Frontier. We are proud to have her a member of the Frontier Family, celebrating her achievements and the inspiration she provides to all of our students.

Brigette was unable to attend the ceremony at the 2020 School Committee Conference to accept the Frontier Achievement Award due to her Olympic commitments. Her aunt, Joanne Catcheway was present to receive the award on her behalf.

Mental, physical wellbeing key for youth winner

Staying healthy and finding joy in helping others - this year's Healthy Youth Role Model award winner may have been surprised, but organizers found her to be the right choice.

Frontier Collegiate student Kateri Manoakeesick is the recipient of this year's award.

"I was shocked, but also happy. I was a little nervous," she said.

Manoakeesick was awarded the honour during a ceremony at Frontier.

Manoakeesick is from St. Theresa Point, one of the communities covered by Frontier Collegiate. During the school year, Manoakeesick stays, like many other students, in the on-site residences at the school.

A councillor at Frontier Collegiate's residences nominated Manoakeesick for the award.

The award is given out by the local National Addictions Awareness Week committee, which hand it out to a deserving winner going to school in Flin Flon, Creighton or Cranberry Portage. The group takes submissions from teachers, students and staff for the award. This year, a record number of nominees came in from Frontier.

"You can tell in the enthusiasm in the person who nominated her and in speaking to the school staff. They were very enthusiastic about her name when it came up," said committee member Amanda Link-Labarre.

To qualify for the award, a youth must show a commitment to school, community and personal health. Manoakeesick is part of several Frontier sports teams and finds joy in sports and exercise.

"In the evenings, I go to the gym. I don't like the feeling of being lazy," she said.

Mental health is also an important side of personal wellbeing for Manoakeesick. She said while she and other students can feel down or upset, she can help or assist in finding help for students.

"I can talk to my friends when I'm feeling down, or I spend time drawing or reading books and thinking by myself. It works for me. If I'm really down, I can see my counsellor for help and they'll help me. Whenever I see someone down, like one of my friends, I can help them too," she said.

After graduating, Manoakeesick wants to help her home community. She intends to pursue education and possibly return to her hometown in the future.

January 29, 2020 Students Participate in Traditional Food Preparation, Trapping and more at Winter Cultural Gathering



On January 24th and 25th, students and staff from Frontier Collegiate and Engaged Learners joined to host a Winter Cultural Gathering at Egg Lake.

Knowledge Keepers and Traditional Gift Givers from around Manitoba came together to share cultural knowledge and teachings with students in Frontier School Division.

Youth learned about the construction and teachings of the Tipi. Students participated in traditional food preparation, including trapping, visiting an active trap line and fish scaling.

Students learned how to field dress and harvest a tundra caribou from a traditional perspective. The group also successfully built outdoor shelters using materials from the land.

In addition, facilitated sessions were offered on soapstone carving and traditional Indigenous beading. Youth had the opportunity to make their own hand drums together with Elder Andrew Daniels and traditional helper Joe Partridge.

The gathering was filled with student engagement and excitement. We would like to extend a huge thank you to everyone who participated in planning and supporting these necessary opportunities for our youth in Frontier School Division.

January 20, 2020 Honouring Daisy Monias



The Frontier Family and community of Norway House Cree Nation acknowledges the unexpected passing of Ms. Daisy Monias, Area 5 Superintendent. A celebration of Daisy's life took place in her community on January 4th with family, friends and colleagues sharing many stories, tears and laughter.

Daisy was born in Norway House and raised in a simple traditional lifestyle. She learned early how to work hard, the value of community and the importance of her language and culture.

Beginning her teaching career 30 years ago, Daisy's passion was education. She worked closely with children with special needs and went on to complete her Special Education certificate and her Master's. Daisy developed programs to support all learners before eventually moving to administration, taking on the role as Area 5 Superintendent in 2018.

Daisy served her community in other roles as well, including chair of the Cree Nation's Post-Secondary Education Advisory Board, and committee member for the Canadian Research Institute for the Advancement of Women.

In 2019, the Aboriginal Circle of Educators awarded Daisy its annual award for her work in preserving the Cree language.

Cree culture was an important part of Daisy's values and a guiding force in her practice. She brought many traditions into school during her time as an administrator, from drumming to land-based education. In her own life, she honoured her heritage and was gifted with the traditional name Mikisew Mekwan (Eagle Feather).

The Frontier Family and the community of Norway House keeps Daisy's five children, six grandchildren and countless former students and colleague in our thoughts and prayers.
