Renewed Partnership with Black River First Nation

On Friday, June 14, 2019, the Frontier School Division Board of Trustees and the Black River First Nation Council renewed their education agreement. The signing marks the continuation of a seven-year relationship between the school division and the First Nation community.

Situated on Treaty 5 territory, the community is located approximately 138 kilometers northeast of Winnipeg. Black River First Nation is an Ojibway community with a population of approximately 980 people.

The revised agreement places emphasis on the wishes of the First Nation and includes programming for academics, indigenous way of life, wellness.

Councilor Oral Johnston expressed his appreciation for the partnership and is looking forward to the future. Frontier School Division Board Chairperson Linda Ballantyne stated, "by working together we will make a difference for the students and the community, and that is what this partnership is all about".

Chief Sheldon Kent could not attend the Board meeting and signing due to a personal matter but was able to find some time to meet with Chief Superintendent Reg Klassen on June 12, 2019, to discuss and sign the Agreement.

On Friday, May 31, 2019, the Frontier School Division Board of Trustees and the Berens River First Nation Chief and Council renewed their education agreement.

The signing marks the continuation of a fifty-plus year relationship between the school division and the First Nation community.

Situated on Treaty 5 territory, the community is located approximately 362 kilometers north of Winnipeg. Berens River First Nation is an Ojibway community with a total First Nation population of about 3,500 people.

The revised agreement places emphasis on programming for academics, Indigenous way of life, wellness.

Chief Hartley Everett expressed his thanks to the long-standing partnership and is looking forward to the future, and the importance Frontier School Division has in supporting the youth of the Berens River First Nation. He also expressed his gratitude to the opportunities the Division has provided over the years and is excited for the future.

Frontier School Division Board Chairperson Linda Ballantyne stated, "by working together we will strengthen the relationship and partnership, and the end result will be increased student achievement and success now and into the future". Chief Superintendent Reg Klassen added, "this long and storied relationship survived the test of time, and we look forward to another fifty years of educational partnership".

The Frontier School Division Board of Trustees, Chief, and Council for the Skownan First Nation renewed their education agreement on Wednesday, May 29, 2019.

The signing marks the continuation of a 30-year relationship between the school division and the First Nation community.

Situated on Treaty 2 territory, the community is located approximately 288 kilometers north of Winnipeg on the south shore of Waterhen Lake. Skownan First Nation is an Ojibway community with a total population of about 1,500 people. Since 1989, the Skownan First Nation has operated their school – Skownan School – in partnership with Frontier School Division. The school currently has a population of 110 students.

The revised agreement places emphasis on meeting the holistic needs of students, including their spiritual, emotional, physical, mental well-being and academic aspirations.

Chief Catcheway thanked Frontier School Division Board Trustees and senior administrators in attendance, noting they have the best interests of the community's children at heart. He also paid tribute to the late Nelson Catcheway, a former Councilor who was instrumental in getting the school in Skownan.

Frontier School Board Chairperson Linda Ballantyne stated, "This agreement provides a clear and influential voice of the community in terms of advice, recommendations and directions to Frontier School Division on behalf of First Nation students" and "We look forward to building on our history together and past successes while focusing on the future of our children".

Chief Superintendent Reg Klassen added, "The privilege of working in this vibrant and forward-thinking educational partnership is very exciting for Frontier".

Shirley Nepinak Named Indigenous Educator of the Month



We are proud to announce that Shirley Nepinak was recently recognized as Indigenous Educator of the Month for April 2019.

The <u>Indigenous Educator of the Month</u> was started by the Manitoba Government to showcase Indigenous educators throughout the province. Candidates are selected representing a balance from the four directions, cultural groups and gender.

Joining the Frontier Family in 2005, Shirley has been a high school teacher at Minegoziibe Anishinabe School for almost 15 years. Shirley has taught a variety of classes, from science to math and extra curriculars, but she is best known as an English Language Arts teacher.

As a teacher and community member, Shirley has helped organize and facilitate baking, beading and star-blanket-making programs within the Pine Creek community. She volunteers for both high school sports and grad committees, raising money for events.

Shirley is currently completing her thesis for her Masters of Education through Brandon University, researching how Indigenous culture, knowledge and teachings can support students in learning environments.

She is also an active member of the Indigenous Inclusion Directorate, volunteering with the UCN/U of M Summer Institute as a beading instructor, and was previously part of the Test Development Committee (TDC) for the Grade 12 Language Arts Standards Test.

Asked to comment on this recognition, Shirley said, "As a learner, I feel as though I am a knowledge gatherer. I am working my way in the circle of life in becoming a knowledge keeper, a sacred role in our community."



- Evidence of development and implementation of effective practices in their field of work.


Nomination packages must be recieved by Reg Klassen, Chief Superintedent, at the Division Office no later than Friday April 19, 2019.

The Frontier Achievement Award was established by the Frontier School Board in 1998 to recognize and honor the achievements of a Frontier graduate as well as those who have attended a Frontier school or Home Placement. Candidates demonstrate outstanding career or lifetime achievement in a variety of fields such as community service, sports, law, education, health and business.

Vern attended school at Oscar Blackburn School in South Indian Lake. He moved to Cranberry Portage where he graduated from Frontier Collegiate in 1984. Vern furthered his education by attending Brandon University through the P.E.N.T. Program. He held various positions including Instructional Assistant at the Dakota Collegiate, Child Care Worker with Tumbler Ridge Family Support Society, and a Life Skills Instructor for New Directions and then graduated from Red River College Diploma Program in Child and Youth Care.

Vern is currently the Student Advisor in Frontier School Division's Work Education Program working with students that go through the Work Education, Student Leadership, University Tours and Mini University Programs.

Vern spends many hours volunteering his time to organize and fundraise for Rossbrook House, South Indian Lake Winter Fun Day, Siloam Mission, Volunteer Canadian Ranger and Board member in Co-op Housing, Youth Task Force, Cultural Competency at New Directions, Project Neechewan and Booth University College member of the Indigenous Advisory Council.

Vern initiated and continues to raise funds for the Arnold Dysart Bursary which is awarded to a South Indian Lake graduating student from Frontier Collegiate.

Vern is proud of his Indigenous Heritage and language and shares his knowledge of the Cree Language and Culture with students and adults. He has taken time to accompany students on canoe trips, he brings his experience to teach students about Indigenous Culture and Way of Life.

Mr. Vern Anderson was announced as the award winner at the 41st Annual School Committee Conference on February 6, 2019 during Celebrations of Achievements event. Congratulations Vern!

The Frontier School Division Board of Trustees and Chief and Council for the Birdtail Sioux First Nation renewed their education agreement on Tuesday, December 11, 2018.

The signing marks the continuation of a 10-year relationship between the school division and the First Nation community. Located approximately 50 kilometers north of Virden, Manitoba, Birdtail Sioux is a Dakota First Nation community with an on-reserve population of about 500 people. Since 2007, Chief and Council have operated their school, Chan Kagha Otina Dakota Wayawa Tipi School, in partnership with the Frontier School Division.

The school currently has a population of 137 students.

The revised agreement places emphasis on meeting the holistic needs of students, including their spiritual, emotional, physical, and mental well-being.

"I am very pleased with the new agreement," says Birdtail Sioux Chief Kenneth Chalmers. "As Dakota people we needed a new and unique agreement that reflected our culture, language and history. We are confident the education to come will support our children's success so they can graduate from high school well-prepared for participation in life and life-long learning."

Chief Chalmers thanked Frontier Chief Superintendent Reg Klassen and Frontier Secretary-Treasurer Gerald Cattani, noting that he trusts they have the best interests of the community's children at heart.

"We are very proud to re-sign with Birdtail Sioux," says Reg Klassen. "Our goal is to provide every community with the best educational opportunities that reflect their individual needs. We're looking forward to continue growing with the community and providing the stability and support the students deserve."

Frontier School Board Chairperson Linda Ballantyne added, "the revised agreement speaks to the value we place, as a Division, on ensuring that the educational needs of our diverse communities are met."

The community's economic plan includes building a gaming centre and gas/convenience store in the coming year, followed by a hotel in the near future.

Chief Chalmers is confident that the education Frontier provides will ensure that there is a strong, dependable, self-sufficient labour force that will sustain the economic future of the Birdtail Sioux community.

August 28, 2018

FSD Launches Drone Pilot Training Program

We're excited to announce that we are kicking off another highly innovative instructional program specifically targeting employment opportunities using the leading edge Remotely Piloted Aircraft System (RPAS). The demand for this industry is increasing and expanding faster than the ability to provide qualified pilots for the available jobs. This program will prepare students with the skills and knowledge they need to pilot drones and find employment once they graduate. Current job opportunities include:

- Industrial inspections
- Conservation
- Search and rescue
- Agriculture
- Multimedia entertainment
- Forestry

It's easy to see the inherent interest our young learners have in these technologies; many of them have already developed some of the requisite skills through gaming and social media. Our science and technology departments have collaborated with M3 Aerial Productions, a Transport Canada compliant and University Credit RPAS (Remotely Piloted Aircraft System) Ground School, to develop this graduated RPAS Licensing program for the 2018-2019 school year.

Program Outline

This program will operate in a three-phased approach:

- The first phase will begin with indoor RPAS units and will cover theories of flight, basic operation, and safety.
- The second stage will be both indoor and outdoor and will cover current legislation, flight planning, etc.
- The third and final phase will cover advance flight techniques, work planning, business planning, and official communications.

Each phase has a dedicated RPAS kit with the appropriate units for the given curriculum. The photo below shows how the kits progress in size, complexity, and power.



The two individual kits are for teachers and coaches to use when earning their RPAS certification without breaking up the students' kits.

Once they complete the program, students will be ready to take the Transport Canada RPAS Exam.
