# Frontier Students and Staff Honour The 215 Children Found In Kamloops, BC

Frontier School Division is collectively mourning the loss of the 215 children who were found in the mass grave site in Kamloops, BC.

Here's how many of our students and staff have been taking time to honour the children.

#### **Barrows Junction School**

Barrows Junction School held a moment of silence each day. Staff and students created orange hearts to hang on the fence with words of prayer and hope. They also hung 215 orange ribbons on a tree in school yard.





#### **Berens River School**

The Berens River School community did a drive-by vigil to drop off 215 shoes acknowledgement of the 215 children. The next day, they held a burial of the 215 shoes.





#### Chan Kagha Otina Dakota Wayawa Tipi School

Although the school is in remote learning, Chan Kagha Otina Dakota Wayawa Tipi School staff were at the school to honor the 215 children. The Chief and Council along with staff from the various First Nations departments attended an outdoor service, including an honor song and message from the Chief. Staff and students will continue their heart garden project.





#### **Dauphin River**

Although the school is in remote learning, the Dauphin River School staff created a garden of hearts in the school yard. Parents were encouraged to create hearts and plant them as well. Families in the community were also encouraged to place similar hearts in their front yards and doorsteps to show their solidarity in remembering these children and their families.





## **Duke of Marlborough School**

The Duke of Marlborough School had a moment of silence during morning announcements. The staff and students also wore orange t-shirts, but were unable to go for a community walk and take a group photo due to public health measures.





#### **Falcon Beach School**

At Falcon Beach School, teachers and students engaged in discussions, read newspaper articles and watched news reports. Students also created their own art piece, which are now on display, to represent their thoughts and feelings about what happened, and to honor the victims and their families. The school also gathered outside for a group discussion and moment of silence.



#### **Gypsumville School**

All staff and students at Gympsumbille School wore "Every Child Matters" orange t-shirts and held moments of silence throughout the week.

#### **Matheson Island School**

Matheson Island School students made posters to put in their windows at home and to share with neighbours. They also tied 215 orange ribbons to the fence.





#### **Peonan Point**

Students at Poenan Point have been learning by reading articles, watching videos, and listening to podcasts this month. Following each text, video or podcast, students have the opportunity to write about it or discuss it. Students were also invited to wear orange shirts.

#### **Rorketon School**

Rorketon School held a moment of silence every morning. Staff and students also tied 215 orange ribbons to the outside fence.

#### **Wanipigow School**

Wanipigow School distributed information about the tragic discovery to teachers and lowered their flag. Kateri Phillips conducted a virtual event with students, staff and community. The virtual event included opening remarks and lighting of the smudge by Kateri, an opening prayer by Elder Burma Bushie, prayer songs by Marcel Hardisty and a drum group, words from Ian Bushie, MLA of Keewatinook and Miss Fontaine, and closing remarks by Lisa Raven on behalf of Returning to Spirit.

# Northern Manitoba Drone Program Setting a New Standard



Two FSD students are among few to obtain drone pilot certification.

Two high school students from Frontier School Division's Leaf Rapids Education Centre (LREC) have accomplished the tremendous task of acquiring their RPAS pilot certificates from Transport Canada.

Remotely Piloted Aircraft Systems (RPAS), more commonly referred to as "drones," have become incredibly valuable resources with nearly limitless industrial applications, and can provide northern and remote communities with potentially life-saving resources that were unheard of a decade ago.

It is a complex and onerous process to obtain one's certification to operate an RPAS from Transport Canada, the governing authority overseeing drone certification in Canada. "Pilots are required to demonstrate a deep understanding of aviation knowledge that is tested thoroughly on the government exam," says Matthew Johnson, a former high school mathematics teacher and Vice President of Training at Volatus Aerospace in Winnipeg.

Lucas Lussier and Samantha Glenday completed their Basic RPAS pilot certification exams in March of this year, after having completed an optional credit program at LREC in partnership with Volatus Aerospace. Each student was recognized by their school by receiving their "Frontier Wings" award on June 9th.

"The hardest part was studying for the Transport Canada test," said Lucas Lussier, 17.

"It was hard. The test was hard," Glenday, 16, said. But when asked if she would recommend the program for other students, she said, "Do it! It's fun."

The teacher who led them through the program was Malcolm Hayter, who also completed the training in 2019. Hayter agreed that the course was not easy. "The book work side can be a bit challenging at times, but I think the flying makes up for that," Hayter said. He does believe the licenses will have a positive impact on the students' future: "Knowing how to fly, even at a basic level, gives these young people a leg up. Having basic skills and a passion for flying will open up many opportunities for them in the not-too-distant future."

Lussier agreed, stating that, "Doing this it will provide me with better options for my future." He is considering a career in aeronautics.

The Drones In The Classroom program has been offered by Volatus Aerospace across the Prairies since 2018, helping teachers learn the ropes about drone industry operations. "Frontier School Division has become a Canadian leader in drone education" says Johnson, who has trained over 20 teachers across the division to date. Johnson added that "it is extremely impressive to see high school students receiving their pilot certifications. Frontier is paving a future with opportunities for these students!"

Elizabeth V. Peltz, who works as an administrative assistant at Transport Canada's Remotely Piloted Aircraft System (RPAS) Task Force says that "they should be very proud of their accomplishment!" According to Transport Canada, only 1.6% of licensed drone pilots in Canada are 18 and under.

"There are currently 32 students between the ages of 14-18 that have their basic RPAS certificate in Manitoba..." Peltz said, adding that "Lucas and Samantha are included in these numbers."

Arif Kassum, Science Instructional Coach with Frontier School Division, launched the division-wide drone program to have teachers certified and outfitted with state-of-the-art hardware. "This is a milestone. This is precisely what the program was meant to achieve," said Kassum. "The new licenses expand their options for potential careers as RPAS pilots in aviation, aerospace, and science and engineering. We are thrilled to see them come so far."

#### **JHK Students Build Cedar Smokers**



JHK students are building fully functional cedar smokers in IA this spring. This project covered outcomes from the IA curriculum but also met many Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) goals as well.

Students began by studying smoker plans from an article in Outdoor Canada magazine. They created a cut list and then fabricated a frame from 1" x 1" pieces. Next, students made their own tongue and groove cedar boards on the shaper. These were connected together and attached as the side of the smoker. A plywood base with pressure treated feet was added to resist moisture and rot. Then a cedar roof was added. Students also had to make a door and door jam. We added some details like a rustic log door handle for style. They also made an intarsia trout for additional decoration out of hardwood scraps laying around the shop. Students were able to design their own smoke vent covers. One student used a set of antiers from her fall hunt! Students also had to do some basic metal work for the project. They cut 4 shelves from expanded metal to make the racks for inside. Students were challenged with making their own heating elements! To do this we reclaimed an old stove and 2 bedframes from going to the local landfill. They collected the elements, angle iron, and wire from the salvaged items. Students cut, welded, and wired the element to support 115V power. When all painted up the elements look new and better yet...work! To finish the smokers students applied a natural boiled linseed oil to the outside.

**Students in the JHK Woodworking class** were provided a hands-on learning package during the suspension of classes. The goal was to keep students practicing measurement, layout, cutting, and assembly skills while working from home during Covid-19 restrictions.

Each student was provided with a kit that included: tape measure, glue gun, ruler, hacksaw and wood strips.

# The project was to construct a 1:16 scale model of a 20x30 cabin

Students were also provided paper learning resources, linked powerpoint presentations, and YouTube instructional videos to help with their build. The students followed instructions for completing a foundation, floor, walls, and a roof... **Just like framing a real house!** 

All of the project parts, including 3500 1/8" wood strips were made in the school shop and delivered to the students home.

The following pictures show the foundation, main beams, floor joists, sub-flooring, wall frames, and roof construction.

Students at Lakefront School are taking the holistic approach growing fresh healthy garden plants and seeing seeds turn into lettuce on their burgers!











# Forest to Furniture at Helen Betty Osborne

Students at Helen Betty Osborne Ininiw Education Resource Centre in Norway House are getting out on the land to learn and harvest as part of teacher John Kalmbach's Construction Technology class.

"It ties in with sustainability and resources and where your material comes from," said Kalmbach. "We're kind of experimenting. It's a new adventure."

Kalmbach is running a new Forest to Furniture program that includes field trips to harvest resources for construction projects and artwork. Last September, Kalmbach ran four trips with students and Elder Charles Ettawacappo. They brought back birch each time—about 10 2-inch round trunks—and students made things like tables and artwork like Christmas ornaments.



2020 marked the third consecutive year of the Share2Care campaign and saw school champions from across Canada share 199 mental health initiatives supporting teacher and/or student mental health.



#### **Frontier Schools Receive onetab Devices**



Schools continue to move back and forth from in class learning to remote learning due to COVID-19.

The impact on students learning is being closely monitored and an increasingly amount of research indicates that early learners experience the greatest learning loss during COVID-19 disruptions.

The emerging research is very concerning when you consider that Frontier School Divisions' six-year-old students have already experienced disruptions in their schooling in kindergarten and again this year in Grade 1 and we anticipate that many of our students will have gaps in their learning which we do not take lightly.

Kindergarten provides a structured learning environment and establishes the foundation of learning. The curriculum promotes language and cognitive skills and serves as a preparation for successful transition into Grade 1.

The Grade 1 curriculum focuses on mastering fundamental literacy skills to generate developing strategic independent readers, writers and mathematicians.

Many skills must be mastered in Grade 1 in order for student to keep pace with the increasing demands of the curriculum in the following grades.

Frontier School Division is well aware that COVID-19 disruptions throughout the Division are having a negative impact on students' ability to learn at the earliest stages of reading, writing and numeracy, and is particularly hard on Grade 1 students.

The Division was looking for promising, actionable, and proven strategies to address the learning needs of our Grade 1 learners and saw promise in onetab tablets.



Also important for Frontier is the onetab (mini tablets) do not require internet or wifi and come preloaded with math and literacy activities that adapt for each child and are designed to be fun and engaging.


Many children in remote communities don't have access to technology or reliable internet, so the device solves this problem. Timothy Millican and his mother, Susan Millican, purchased 450 onetabs and gifted them to the Frontier School Division.

The gift was gladly accepted by Chief Superintendent Klassen knowing that the devices had already been proven to be effective for students from Kindergarten to Grade 3. This research has been published in several education journals, and in an independent study in Manitoba conducted by University of Winnipeg Prof. Linda DeRiviere at David Livingstone School in Winnipeg in 2018.

In terms of the roll out Chief Superintendent Klassen stated that the devices will be delivered to the Division's five area offices and then distributed to Grade 1 teachers who will put them in the hands of their Grade 1 students so that their numeracy and literacy skills can continue to grow.

#### FSD Presents: HIIT Workout with Coach RJ from FitClub


Attention all PE Teachers and Students!







Since 2009, Elder Tait played a significant role as an employee at Jack River School. His involvement with Indigenous language and cultural teachings was shared with hundreds of students over his time at the school. He also helped create the Jack River School drum group that over the years had countless students perform at local events and at the Division's Annual School Committee Conference.

Albert was very fluent in the Ininimowin language and enjoyed sharing what he knew in the traditional way of life. He loved storytelling,

offering traditional teachings, participating in traditional ceremonies and holding sweats in his sweat lodge.

In 2014 the Frontier School Division Board of Trustees held a meeting at the Misipawistik Cree Culture Camp that involved senior administration and Elders. Albert was a part of the Elders involved to meet with the Board and his insights supporting Indigenous language and culture were profound.







We honour and respect the memory of Albert throughout all of our schools and communities in the Frontier Family.



Indigenous way of life is at the centre of all our teachings in Frontier School Division, and we're always proud to see our students exploring new educational experiences.

A recent hunting expedition gave a Black River Anishinabe School student an opportunity to live the seven sacred teachings. While on this expedition, grade 5 student Treyson and his father Blaine caught a moose together. Treyson asked if he could share the moose meat they received with local elders in the community of Black River, as a sign of respect for all they do for the community.

The decision to share the moose meat was suggested by Lakota, Treyson's older sister. Treyson decided to share the moose meat, because in his words, "You should always take care of your elders."

After cutting up the meat, Treyson visited the homes of several elders in the community and delivered care packages of fresh moose meat and organs. The elders were delighted with these gifts, demonstrating Treyson's understanding of the traditional First Nations way of life.

This is a wonderful example of the teachings of love, respect and humility on display for the entire community, and sets an excellent example for the other students. When asked how he felt about his gift, Treyson simply said, "It was the right thing to do," also noting his dad is very proud of him for choosing to share this gift.
