ABOUT THE COMMUNITY

God's Lake Narrows boasts a Northern Store, a gas bar, two restaurants, multiple convenience stores, a post office, and a community hall meant for general recreation. Common passtimes include movie nights, fishing derbies, and swimming. Public services are present in the form of an RCMP detachment, a volunteer fire brigade, and a nursing station.

God's Lake Narrows refers to both the community and the adjacent First Nation reserve. According to oral history shared by local Elders, the area surrounding God's Lake has been part of the traditional territories of the local Ininiwak since time immemorial. Non-Indigenous settlement of the area began with the construction of a Hudson's Bay Company trading post in 1825, and peaked during the local gold mining era of the 1930s and 40s.



SUBSIDIZED HOUSING IN GOD'S LAKE NARROWS

There are two houses for staff available, one is a 2-bedroom unit and the other a 3-bedroom. One house is within the school yard and the other is just past the school fence. Utilities are covered in the rent and Frontier School Division provides maintenance.

Wireless internet is available but is the responsibility of the tenant.

SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

Due to its limited enrollment, each student at Ministic School receives a lot of focus from staff in helping them reach their educational goals, and there is a tight-knit sense of community amidst the students and their families. Ministic School is also well regarded for its arts programming, with a variety of awards and acknowledgements to their name from Frontier School Division in recognition of their talent with visual arts.

- We provide our teachers with PD and other supports to ensure our students receive a quality, inclusive education that includes Indigenous perspectives, local language(s), and cultural programming.
- Frontier School Division has a unique 3-tiered, grassroots governance system to help provide meaningful, appropriate, and locally relevant education in our schools.
- Frontier School Division spans nearly 75% of the province and is organized into 5 Areas.
