ABOUT THE COMMUNITY

Thicket Portage is one of the many communities located along the Hudson Bay Railway between The Pas and Churchill. The economy is primarily focused on seasonal activities such as trapping, fishing, and tree-planting, though both tourism and wild rice harvesting have become more notable in recent years.

The portage route for which the community is named has served as a vital part of the water highway system connecting local lakes with the Nelson River. The portage route has been used as a path between Landing Lake and Wintering Lake since time immemorial, and was later adopted by fur traders from the Hudson's Bay Company and other newcomers who sought to use the area as a travelling point to reach further inland across the continent.



SUBSIDIZED HOUSING IN THICKET PORTAGE

Staff housing is located across the parking lot from the school. Every unit has a fridge, stove, washer, and dryer. Heat and electricity are included in the rent and Frontier School Division provides maintenance. Up to two pets are allowed.

Internet is available but must be arranged and paid for by the tenant.

SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

As a part of Frontier School Division, Thicket Portage School has a focus on individual and supportive learning, landbased education facilitated by our Indigenous Way of Life Department and community Elders, as well as opportunities for adventurous experiences both inside and outside the classroom. Thicket Portage School aims to give both students and teachers the opportunity to learn more about themselves and their community as part of their day to day life, and foster an educational experience that is unique to Frontier.

• Frontier School Division has a unique 3-tiered, grassroots governance system to help provide meaningful, appropriate, and locally relevant education in our schools.

• Frontier School Division spans nearly 75% of the province and is organized into 5 Areas.
